Description

This interdisciplinary course explores how gender and sexuality are socially, historically, and culturally constructed in Taiwan. Through readings, multimedia, and class discussion it covers a broad range of issues in the fields of gender, masculinity, LGBTQ+, femininity, and sexual identity studies, allowing students to conceptualize these topics in both the past and present, and from theoretical and practical perspectives. The class includes analyzing how gender and sexuality as both a lived experience and topic of study intersect with other identities shaped by class, race, ethnicity, and age.

For each of the three core topics of LGBTQ+, masculinity, and femininity, the course considers the historical development of ideas and realities about gender and sexuality. Moving to the modern and contemporary eras, it surveys the emergence of political and social movements for rights and legitimacy. In seeking to understand the relationship between sexuality, gender, and power, course topics also include issues of migration and global human flow, sex work, family and reproduction, domestic and sexual violence, and the path to and aftereffects of the 2019 decision to legalize same-sex marriage in Taiwan, which made it the leader of the struggle for LGBTQ+ rights in Asia. At least one field class increases the diversity of voices in the course.

Content warning:

At times, this course intentionally invites students to engage with readings and content that are controversial. Students might find this disturbing. The intention is not to endorse perspectives, but rigorously engage with them. If certain material is emotionally challenging, students can discuss with the professor before or after class. Students may also leave the classroom without academic penalty if the discussion becomes too emotionally challenging. Students are, however, responsible for all missed material, and so should arrange to get notes from another student or see the professor individually.

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Objectives

In this course, students:

- gain the ability to situate gender and sexuality within Taiwanese cultures and its social, cultural, legal, economic, and institutional settings.
- master key concepts, theories, and histories underpinning the field of gender and sexuality studies.
- distinguish the power structures that shape dominant assumptions about gender and sexuality and develop greater awareness of people whose lived experiences do not neatly fit these expectations.
- strengthen critical understandings and attitudes towards new sexual forms that permeate everyday encounters.
- advance or refine skills in critical reading of primary and secondary sources; researching and collecting information, evaluating evidence, developing arguments, and formulating conclusions; and communicating orally and in writing in a clear, concise, and cogent manner.

Course Requirements

Students are expected to attend each class as outlined in the CET Attendance Policy. Active participation in class is essential. Students are to read or view all assigned materials before each class session and come prepared to participate thoughtfully in class discussions. Reading assignments average about 50-80 pages per class.

In addition to course preparation and participation, graded assignments include:

- A 10-minute class presentation with slides on a topic related to the course
- Four short response papers on the assigned class readings
- A final research paper (15 pages/ 3,750 words) on a topic connected to our course and determined in consultation with the professor

Grading

- 20% Preparation for class and participation in discussions
- 20% Individual presentation to the class
- 20% Short response papers (4 papers, at 5% each)
- 40% Final research paper
