Description

This course is designed for non-native speakers with 3 years of previous training in Chinese who possess strong reading and speaking skills.

The course includes an introduction to Chinese culture, and traditional Chinese philosophy and literary works. Students glean a general understanding of Chinese history, prominent historical figures and their ideas, important Chinese cultural phenomena, etc. Students are guided in reading and comprehending the classical Chinese (*guwen*) course materials, and in using modern Chinese to express the content and tone of the texts. Particular emphasis is placed on classical Chinese words, grammatical terms and sentence structures that are still being used today.

Objectives

In this course, students:

- Gain an understanding of traditional Chinese culture, history and society, laying a foundation for future study of Chinese language and culture
- Learn the basic structure and grammar of classical Chinese and master the basic content phrases, function words and sentences typically found in classical texts
- Cultivate their ability to read upper-level modern Chinese texts, such as the newspaper or literary works, that draw on classical Chinese conventions
- Gain a foundation in the etymology of many compounds and phrases seen in modern Chinese, thereby developing their ability to communicate in Chinese on formal occasions

Course Requirements

Classes are highly interactive and student-centered. Students are expected to come to class having thoroughly prepared the passages or articles assigned. Active participation is required.

The instructor provides a background to the selected text—an overview of relevant parts of traditional Chinese history, society, etc. The instructor then guides the students through the classical text so that key content and function words are understood. Students translate the passage into accurate modern Chinese. Students practice reading the text aloud and explaining the text's background.

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The course includes daily homework and comprehensive midterm and final exams.

Methods of Evaluation

The final grade is determined as follows:

Attendance 10%

Participation 5%

Daily performance 10%

Homework and quizzes 20%

Midterm examination 25%

Final examination 30%
