## **Reflections in Taiwan**

For instance, most of my life I have lived a sheltered life, so coming here, where I have to take the bus to and from school every day, hang out with my friends, and find time for homework all on my own, in addition to, to arriving to Taiwan on my own: taking plane to plane to plane, saving my summer pay. It all just proves to me that, as much as I think I can do things on my own, I now know I can do anything I set my mind to. There are always hiccups in the way, especially when I am a large black woman in an Asian country. Between the stares, glares, and questioning looks at the clothing store, there will always be daily challenges. But I'm certain that this experience is and was one that I will always value.
