Description

This anthropological course offers a general introduction to the peoples, cultures and traditions of the Arab world and wider Middle East with a primary focus on Jordanian ethnography. The complex cultural and socio-political life in contemporary Jordan is highlighted, offering students a cultural framework for learning the Arabic language. Throughout the course, students challenge their assumptions and stereotypes about the Middle East's history, cultures, traditions, religions and politics. Topics include the various groups that inhabit the region, their languages/dialects, religious affiliations, economies and other cultural and social variables.

This course begins meeting a few weeks into the program, after a period of intensive instruction in MSA and Jordanian dialect. Depending on the number of students enrolled, the course may be split up into smaller groups so instructors can devote personalized attention to students at varying levels of Arabic to ensure all students are able to actively participate in the larger class meetings. Class sections make up approximately one-third of the total class hours, while large group meetings and activities make up the remaining two-thirds.

Objectives

In this course, students:

- Gain an understanding of the variety and complexity of life in the contemporary Arab world from a cultural, ethnic, historical and socio-political perspective.
- Describe the physical and environmental features of the Arab world and the historical distribution of its population.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the various Islamic traditions and their manifestations within socio-cultural milieus.
- Unveil and critique cultural stereotypes of the Middle East.
- Develop speaking and writing skills learned in Modern Standard Arabic class through oral presentations and written analyses
- Augment Arabic vocabulary with high-frequency vocabulary phrases and expressions used in historical documentation and analysis

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Course Requirements

Students must complete all reading assignments before coming to class. Readings are contemporary writings and range from 10 to 30 pages per class session. Active class participation is essential. Students are expected to work through texts thoroughly at home and come to class with an active understanding of the content. The class format is based on readings, text analysis and discussions. Site visits supplement course material and participation is mandatory. In addition to daily participation points, students are responsible for two short papers, presentations and a final paper/project.

Methods of Evaluation

The final grade is determined as follows:

Participation and attendance	30%
